COMMUNITY PROFILE

Anmatjere is the name given to Ti Tree town and its surrounding communities and smaller outstations. These are Pmara Jutunta (Six Mile), Nturiya (Station) and Wilora (Stirling) as well as the outstations of Adelaide Bore, Alyuen, Petyale and Woods Camp.

Anmatjere is located 194km north of Alice Springs by road travelling on the Stuart Highway. By road, it takes 10 minutes to drive to the closest airstrip in Ti Tree Town then 30 minutes to fly to Alice Springs. The road from Alice Springs to Ti Tree Town is sealed.



RECENT COMMUNITY ACHIEVEMENTS

- ✓ Improved waste services with upgrades to all four landfills, and many tonnes of car bodies and other metals recycled
- ✓ Finalist in the Keep Australia Beautiful competition, winning the mid sized community category. Fifty trees were planted to improve the amenity of the town
- ✓ No dog attacks were reported
- ✓ Improvements to the overnight respite services included the installation of a fire safety system
- ✓ Represented the region in the Imparja Cup Cricket Carnival
- ✓ The Community Development Program activity centre was expanded from one central location at Ti Tree to four centres (now including Pmara Jutunta, Nturiya and Wilora) making it easier for participants to meet their daily activity requirements
