

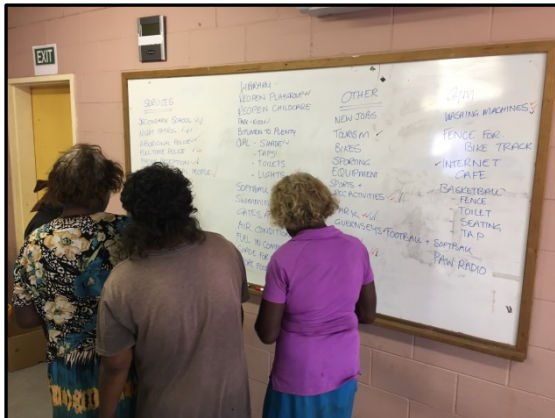

COMMUNITY PROFILE



Engawala, or Alcoota Station as it is also known, is located in the Anmatjere Ward off the Plenty Highway approximately 200km from Alice Springs.

According to the 2016 Census, 154 people call Engawala home. They enjoy the services of a women's centre, a childcare, a school, a remote health clinic, a playgroup and a Regional Council Office.

RECENT COMMUNITY ACHIEVEMENTS

- ✓ Microwave system installed improving internet and computer services
- ✓ Fire breaks and airstrip well maintained
- ✓ Local Authority funding being allocated to the purchase of solar lights, upgrading the community laundry facility, purchasing and planting fruit trees, extending shade areas and improving cooking pits at the Kangaroo cooking area
- ✓ Reorganising the waste pit system increasing their lifespan by four to five years
- ✓ Improvements to the parking apron at the airstrip increasing the parking capacity to six aircraft
- ✓ Installation of a warning circle and windsock facility at the airstrip
- ✓ Two female patrollers employed by the Community Safety Patrol
- ✓ Opening of Engawala Playgroup
